From the School Director:

New Sponsorships: We thank God for the opportunities you have created for our children. Four more have received sponsorship this month. They were elated to hear that they had received the 'coveted' sponsorship. Government Support: We have never received any financial support from the Kenyan government since our inception. They do not support any non government schools, however we are still required to pay licenses, land rates, fire extinguishers fees, registration fees and so much more. Local education officials do help in things like keying into government exam codes, having new or latest information concerning education standards and requirements etc. **Our children are happy in school.** They work hard at their lessons, learning Kiswahili and English. Many of them go through hardships in their home lives, yet we help them by giving love and support. (Edward)



Meet ALOICE Omondi

Aloice is 16 years old and graduated from Junior High School (Yr 9) at New Hope in 2025 being one of our top students, gaining excellent grades. He was offered a place in one of the best Senior High Schools in Nairobi. However, school fees and other necessities that were required before Aloice could enrol, meant that he was unable to begin the school year.

Aloice wrote to us, explaining his situation: *"My parents have not been able to help me to go to Senior School because of their financial instability. I therefore tried to create a small business for myself by selling fast foods beside the road hoping I could earn enough to buy some of the High school requirements but it was hard because of so much competition. So a friend asked me to join him in selling clothes which he said would be easy but I earned nothing the first week. I earned \$2 or less per day but it wasn't enough to cater for my transport or lunch, so I did not eat during the day to save some of what I earned. My mother has tried her best to help me but my father is addicted to alcohol so any money he gets from his seasonal job is all spent on alcohol. He told me I didn't need to go to school. But my mother wants me to go to school. I would like to thank you for taking your time to read this short description of my current situation".*

I am very happy to report that Aloice now has a sponsor and has started at Homabay Boys School in early March. Pictured right is Aloice in his new school uniform. Janet
